Ideas to use "Musical Movements" in the Classroom

(During class time, for workshops, etc)

Twinkle Twinkle Little Star



- Dramatize by acting it out.
- Supplies:
 - o Flashlight
 - Stick, yellow paper, glue/tape
- Turn off the lights in the classroom and give each child a flashlight. While singing, shine the light around the room.
- Make star props with each child for them to hold throughout the song.
- Arts & Crafts
 - Cut a sponge into the shape of a star and paint with it to make sponge artwork on a black background. Hang it up around the room.
- Rhyming of the song such as "star" and "are"



This Old Man



- Do the fingerplay shown in the book using hands and body parts.
- Make rhyming words, even silly ones that don't really make sense. Have children think about them.

De Colores



- Use <u>colorful scarves</u> and wave them around to represent the leaves, flowers, and birds in springtime.
- Sway side to side, up and down
- Rainbow art
- Supplies
 - O Glue
 - O Tissue Paper
 - · Hard Stock paper
 - Roll little balls of tissue paper and put it in layers matching to the colors of the rainbow on a sheet of paper.
- Make a <u>list of animal sounds</u> in Spanish and a list of animal songs in English to compare the two.
 - Ciri ciri vs. cock-a-doodle-doo → rooster
 - \circ Cara cara vs. cluck cluck \rightarrow hen
 - Pio pio vs. peep peep → baby chicks
- Therefore, you are comparing two languages.

The Finger Band




- Use finger movements of each instrument while singing.
- Play bingo to learn about the instrument names
- Supples:
 - Index cards
 - Pictures of instruments
 - o Bingo boards
 - Red chips
- As the song is playing, have children put a chip on the instrument card on the board when they hear the instrument. So that they can learn about the instruments.

Hickory Dickory Dock



- Follow the hand movements of the clock, mouse, etc.
- Use it to do math with the children by counting up to four and look at the hands of the clock.

Five Little Fishies



- Get fish crackers and put them in a bowl. Write the numbers 1-5 on index cards and pretend to be the fishermen. Have 5 fish crackers in bowl at first and ask which number card is 5. Pretend to be fisherman and take a fish one at a time and eat it. Good subtraction. Sinc 5-1 is 4. 4-1 is 3. And so on until no more fishes are left.
- Or can do it with magnets put magnet on five fish props. Have children
 make the prop with card stock. Use straw and yarn with magnet attached
 and do a fishing game.

The Eensy Weensy Spider



- Do multiple rounds of the song as a calming down song with variation. In the classroom this song can be done before reading a book, before nap time, or even for transitions.
- <u>1st round</u> do with hand movements and sing
- <u>2nd round</u> do hand movements without singing and instead humming the tune
- <u>3rd round</u>- only do hand movements without any sounds

Mary Had A Little Lamb





- Use a lamb puppet to dance with and act out the part of the lamb.
- Talk about the importance of rules with the children. As questions such as:
 - What would happen if you brought your pet to school?
 - What would happen if a farmer brought his/her cow to school? Why?

The Animal Song



- Use props of each animal and move while singing.
- While singing, act out each movement (hopping, running in place, tip-toeing, and thumping) while making the animal noises.

Jack and Jill Went Up The Hill



- Sing the rhyme and follow the hand movements using thumbs
- You can also dramatize the rhyme by acting it out while singing
- Needed supplies:
 - o Baseball cap for Jack
 - Bonnet for Jill
 - A bucket
 - An ace bandage
- Some questions to ask the children:
 - Why were Jack and Jill fetching water?
 - What were they going to use the water for?
 - O What made Jack fall down?
 - o Could it have been the wind?
 - o Maybe he tripped on a rock?
 - o I wonder why Jill fell down too?
- Play with Water
 - Put two pails of water on the table. Give children sponges, hand mixers, measuring cups and spoons.
 - Ask them "What do you think Jack and Jill were going to do with their water?"
- Play with the Injury
 - Stock the table with bandages, tape, gauze, ointments (lotion), blunt scissors, ice packs.
 - o Have the children doctor each other and the teacher as well.

- Play with the Rock
 - Ask, "maybe Jack tripped over a rock and landed on Jill?"
 - If the rock was painted bright colors Jack would not have tripped over it. So let the children paint rocks.
- Needed supplies:
 - \circ One medium sized rock per child
 - o Acrylic paints in a variety of colors
 - Paint brushes
 - o Protective clothing
- Let the children use the paints to decorate their rocks.
